any preachers and scholars put a lot of emphasis to have full faith, without any reasoning, on all the concepts of a religion. They forget the fact that the present generation of humanity is living in the Science Age / Space Age / Communication Age and new scientific information is accumulating at such a high speed that it is even becoming difficult for most of the scientists to keep pace with the progress. If a concept that cannot stand the test of science and logic, is taught in any religion it will not be able to hold its ground when its truth is exposed by science. It first happened in Christianity and now is happening in other religions. The following report is the best example to explain the whole truth that a wrong concept in a faith cannot stand for a long:

Nearly four centuries after the Vatican condemned Nicholas Copernicus's discovery that the earth revolved around the sun, another Pole - Pope John Paul - visited the astronomer's birthplace on June 7, 1999 and praised his scientific achievements. But the Pope noted that science and religion are still grappling to find common ground in the "service of truth." In 1992, the Pope formally proclaimed that the church erred when it condemned Galileo for supporting Copernicus's theory, which had been denounced in 1616 as dangerous for the faith. It remained on the church's index of prohibited books until 1822. "The discovery made by Copernicus, and its importance for the history of science, remind us of the ever-present tension between reason and faith," John Paul told officials of the university in Torun, Poland, named after the astronomer [1].

If a wrong decision taken by the church or the Pope in 1616 CE can be reversed in 1992 by another Pope, then why cannot the Jathedar of the Akal Takht reverse the wrong decisions taken by his predecessor/s? The irony is that some Sikh politicians and scholars consider the position of the Jathedar of the Akal Takht equivalent to that of the Pope. Even then they are not ready to follow the good gesture of the Pope shown towards Copernicus and Galileo, who challenged the wrong concept of the church - the sun revolves around Moreover, Nanakian Philosophy, earth. incorporated in the Aad Guru Granth Sahib (AGGS), does not support the position of priesthood of any type in Sikhism (Sikhi or Gurmat). Consequently, there is no such position in the Gurdwara Act of 1925 even then some theologians and Sikhs are creating a highest priest class with full political and religious powers in Sikhism. There is another lesson from the above report that the clergy should not formulate any concept or code in the future that cannot stand the test of Gurbani, science and logic - the touchstones of truth.
