Contributions of Mr BALJIT SINGH CHADHA For Promoting

SIKHISM, EDUCATION, AND MULTICULTURALISM

he Institute for Understanding Sikhism (IUS), Laval, Quebec is honoring Mr Baljit Singh Chadha of Montreal for his manifold contributions. As a true Sikh, he has excelled in *sewa* (service to humanity) and specifically undertaken and supported activities designed to promote understanding of Sikhism through a spectrum of endeavors focused on the education sector. In the process he has enriched and contributed to the multicultural mosaic of Canada.

Born in Mumbai (less than 50 years ago), immigrated to Canada at age 21, educated at Western Ontario and Concordia University, Mr Chadha, who began his entrepreneurship 25 years ago (with borrowed capital and a single desk), has built a major trading house (with annual sales exceeding \$50 million) enabling him to establish the Chadha Family Foundation. Over the past 10 years, Mr Chadha has come to contribute significantly, as seen in the list of major contributions aimed at the following:

Understanding of Sikhism

- Underwriting and guaranteeing fifty percent of the \$600,000 budget and significant support (\$33,000) of "The Arts of Sikh Kingdoms", an exhibition held at the Royal Ontario Museum in Toronto during 2000:
- Financial support for a course on Sikhism (available for credit to students from all universities) to be offered at McGill University starting January 2002;
- Establishment of the Canadian Sikh Council, 2001;
- Generous support to charitable Sikh organizations across Canada, including the Centennial Sikh Education Corporation (Ontario), the Sikh Education Center of Cornwall, the Sikh Education Center of Montreal, the Sikh Society of Oshawa, Shri Guru Ravidas Sabha, Montreal and the Gurdwara Sahib Quebec;
- Support for Sikh Chaplaincy.

Education Sector

- Establishment of a permanent endowment (\$250,000 each) at McGill and Concordia universities for 10 bursaries (\$25,000 annually) in perpetuity. These bursaries are primarily for Indo-Canadian students;
- Seed grants to students and scholars at French language universities Université de Quebec a Montreal (UQAM) and Université de Montreal (UdeM) engaged in research on India studies;
- Financial support to the Inter-University Network for India Studies attracting participation of scholars from Montreal's four major universities;
- Funding for the establishment of a Technology Center at Lower Canada College, Montreal;
- Support (\$20,000) for research on cardiology at the Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal;
- Funding for the Hellenic Scholarship Foundation;
- Development of course material for the Diploma offered by AMCEQ (Quebec Association of Trading Houses) and the Government of Quebec.
- Creation of the Montreal Council of the Indo-Canada Chamber of Commerce:

Multiculturalism

- Sponsorship of the Annual Galas for charitable causes at the Saidye Bronfman Center for the Arts and the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts;
- Contributions towards the construction and renovation of the Hindu *Mandir*/Temple in Dollard des Ormeaux (Montreal), Tamil Temple of the Saiva Mission of Quebec, Spanish-Portuguese Synagogue, and the renovation of the Orthodox Church of St. Markella & St. Irene, Montreal;
- Funding towards the operations of Bharat Bhavan (Community Center for South Asians in Montreal);
- Start-up grant for the Community Center in Parc Extension, Montreal;
- Establishment of International Punjabi Society for Central Canada.

In recognition of his continuing contributions in various fields, Baljit Chadha serves as an advisor to selective departments/agencies of the Governments of Canada, Quebec and the City of Montreal. He has received numerous awards and recognition:
